#### **SECOND BATTALION LETTER, 1932**

DEAR EDITOR,

January 1 found Burma still in a state of rebellion, although the rebel areas were being quickly cleaned up and only a few "bohs" were still unaccounted for.

"A" Company were in Mandalay; "C" Company and a Machine Gun platoon were in Shwebo; the rest of us were in Maymyo. However, by the end of February the 3/6th Rajputana Rifles relieved our detachment at Shwebo. The situation then became normal as far as we were concerned.

Although the Regiment took no very active part in the suppression of the rebellion, the various detachments had considerably interfered with training. There was so much leeway to make up that collective training was of necessity rather sketchy and battalion training impossible. Companies went out to Wetwin Camp for a fortnight at a time and did a certain amount of platoon and company training.

Before "C" Company returned from Shwebo, two platoons, a machine gun section and sixteen buglers did a pleasure cruise for some 400 miles up the Chindwin River "showing the flag." They demonstrated very effectively to numerous possible "galons" that they would be very rash if they thought that charms and tattooing could turn a .303 bullet. I gather the accommodation was not quite up to the standard of a Viceroy of India Mediterranean trip, but it was a change and the party saw a (to them) little known and attractive part of Burma. A full account (with illustrations by Slessor) has already appeared in the REGIMENTAL JOURNAL.

The Individual Training season proceeded according to plan but had to be slightly curtailed to enable the companies for Port Blair and Rangoon to fire their course before they left.

Battalion Training should have been carried out before leaving Maymyo in October. Elaborate arrangements had been made and money authorized to bring the Machine Gun Company up from Mandalay and relieve them with the time expired men. But the monsoon defeated us. The rains went on so late and so heavily that the camp had to be cancelled at the eleventh hour.

A great concession (in the shape of an amendment to Infantry Training) arrived just in time for the King's birthday parade, and the Regiment marched past at the trail with great pride. Apparently it has at last been recognized that Light Infantry are not quite the same as the rest. Discipline was put to the test on this same parade. Our new General made his first appearance on a parade. As he arrived in front of the line his charger, determined not to let the parade down, did a smart right turn, skidded and let himself and master down, master unfortunately landing in a very muddy patch! But not a man smiled. Whilst on the subject of drill, various changes have been made in 52nd drill this year, such as the abandonment of our own peculiar stand at ease position and fixing of bayonets. Possibly some past officers of the 52nd will raise their hands in horror and think that the Regiment is not what it used to be. If they do, then they cannot realize how much stricter higher authority is to-day and how rigidly uniformity with the regulations and training manuals is insisted upon. The present officers hate parting with these unsanctioned little privileges but realize it to be an unpleasant necessity.

The move to Rangoon took place in November, and was spread over about a week. "C" Company began the exodus by departing for a little sea air to Port Blair in the Andaman Islands. "B" Company followed them destined for Sale Barracks, Rangoon,, their old home during the rebellion. The Machine Gun Company then evacuated Mandalay followed by "A" Company and the Headquarter Wing for that model cantonment Mingaladon which is reported to have the best barracks in the East. Surprisingly enough we were not disappointed. Well-laid-out brick barracks with every modern convenience, it must seem like paradise to the men after those in Maymyo. The officers' quarters too are excellent with long baths, electric light, fans, and water laid on.

There is a bus every ten minutes as well as fairly frequent trains, so that the pleasures of Rangoon, although twelve miles distant, are accessible.

There are any amount of games to be had here and against good outside teams, while it is a joy to hear a "talkie" again and see some new faces.

The Colonel preceded us here by ten days and is officiating as Commander of the Rangoon Brigade Area.

Sport is going strong. The football team were only beaten in the semi-final of the Walter Locke Shield after a re-play. The rugby football team, although also beaten in the semi-finals, gave a good account of themselves. In the triangular boxing contest between ourselves, the Buffs and H.M.S. *Effingham* we carried off the trophy. L.-Cpl. Turk won his weight in the All-India Championships while L.-Cpl. Robey did extremely well.

In the Burma District Rifle Meeting our teams did even better than in the previous two years, winning five cups, amongst them the principal cups for rifle, revolver, Lewis gun and machine gun. The machine gunners established two new records. A.R.A. results have not been so good.

Polo has never been in such a healthy condition since we came abroad in 1922. This is almost certainly due to the number of tournaments we have entered for, so that everyone has played in at least one. Altogether twelve teams have been entered for a total of seven tournaments, and for the Senior Fane at Maymyo in October we fielded three teams, and incidentally had an All Regimental subsidiary tournament! We haven't won any tournaments but we have had great fun. As an instance of how this year's entries are coming on, no fewer than three of the team now representing us at Mandalay have only joined us this year. It has been an unlucky year, and an expensive one too, as far as ponies are concerned, for three of our best have died or had to be destroyed.

Here, in Rangoon, the polo season is short and the ground bad and twelve miles away. This means keeping the ponies in Rangoon and thus only seeing them on the polo ground. It is only too easy to spend money on the fleshpots. It will need a great effort to keep polo here as strong as it is now, but it can be done and we must do it. As regards shooting, the snipe, duck and jungle fowl were harried good and proper in Upper Burma. Joint parties of officers and Serjeants have had many good days round Maymyo, Mandalay and Shwebo. We haven't had time to find out the good spots here yet.

Several of us have been out after bigger stuff but with the exception of Montgomery have had little success.

There have been many changes during the year, Horan and Cooke retired early in the year. Winterton, after a spell of a year, in which he was kept fairly busy teaching officers, was taken away from us to be Staff Officer to the Commandant, Small Arms Schools, India. Army Headquarters cannot be accused of having no sense of humour as they selected probably the only infantry officer in India who has never done a musketry machine gun course. Perhaps they wanted someone completely unbiassed. To give Winterton his due he has done both courses since he took up the appointment.

Thorne and Falkiner have both deserted us for the 43rd. No fewer than eight officers joined us early in the year. Darell-Brown, Luard, Temple, Godman and Miles arrived at various intervals after doing their year or so with the 43rd.
