SECOND BATTALION LETTER, 1933

DEAR EDITOR,

January 1 saw the Regiment as split up as ever with B Company in Sale Barracks, Rangoon, and C Company in the Andamans; in this depleted state we shall remain till we leave for Bareilly in the trooping season of 1934-35.

Once we had shaken ourselves down and the polo team had returned from Mandalay, we started so-called battalion training which some found a severe strain on the imagination with only one rifle company and the Machine Gun Company to start with; however, after the first scheme, B Company joined us from Rangoon and eased the strain.

The training area which lies just outside the barracks consists partly of very broken ground with small hillocks, unfortunately all covered with thick scrub which in places is almost impassable, and partly of paddy fields which are only negotiable in the dry weather. Altogether, it is most disappointing and makes anything above company training very difficult.

The rains here are most depressing, lasting from May to well into October; this year we were lucky in the majority of the 95 inches annual rainfall falling early; the weather definitely improved in October, but not sufficiently for polo to start before the end of November. Most of the Regiment seemed to spend some time in hospital, chiefly from dengue, which became an absolute scourge, starting with B Company in Sale Barracks, in the middle of March; after decimating this company it somehow found its way to Mingaladon and did not abate till nearly everyone had fallen a victim.

We have had two visits from the Navy this year. H.M.S. *Emerald* came in January and H.M.S. *'Enterprise* in September, on both occasions life became very hectic, not only in the social world, but also in the athletic, and visits of all descriptions were exchanged. To show what could be done, A Company put on a mammoth fete and dance for the *Enterprise*, which was a huge success and which was attended by the Regiment *en masse* and by a very fair sprinkling from Rangoon.

The Colonel and Powell visited the Andamans on the change of companies in November and May, and each spent six days at Port Blair which were fully employed in sampling all the amenities of the place, bathing at Corbyn's Cove, doing a little clay-bird shooting, and touring round the place; a little time, however, was left to inspect the poor quarters of the detachment on Ross Island.

In February a change in the composition of the Indian platoon occurred; the Kumaonis, who had served with the Regiment since Razmak in 1924, were drafted away to the 19th Hyderabad Regiment, their place being taken by Sikhs from the disbanded Sikh Pioneers. In spite of many appeals and protests, we were forced to say good-bye to Subedar Govind Lall and his men; their departure was a source of mutual regret. They had served the Regiment most loyally and efficiently, and had done all they could to maintain the very high standard in everything which was set by the Subedar.

In August arrived the news that the Indian General Service medal with clasp "Burma 1930-32" was to be awarded to those who served in this country during the rebellion. Our role had not been a glorious or active one except in the case of C Company, who toured far and wide in the Shwebo district which they" certainly kept quiet; otherwise we were merely passive in Maymyo, Mandalay, Rangoon and Meiktila.

A full and varied Individual Training programme kept us employed during the rains. Lectures of considerable interest, arranged by brigade, were a welcome change and were much appreciated. Food for thought on subjects of general and topical interest was provided by several professors from the Rangoon University, and interesting lectures followed by visits gave us a more than passing glimpse of the working of the Burma Oil Company, the Irrawaddy Flotilla Company and the Burma Railways.

The officers turned their hand to theatricals in June and July, and produced a thriller, called *The Joker* which they put on in Mingaladon for the benefit of the Regiment, and then took to the Gymkhana Club in Rangoon. This, to our surprise, proved a huge success, for we were all the greenest of amateurs, so that a project of this nature was a bold experiment.

In the way of sport, 1933 has not been a good year. Polo has suffered from the effects of Rangoon, and losses in ponies have been heavy: two have died from kumrie, and another is so uncertain as not now to be up to tournament form. As usual, it is almost impossible to buy new ones in this very restricted market. Yet polo in Burma is probably in a more promising condition than for many years past.

We put in a team for the Lim Chin Song in February in Rangoon and for Maymyo in April, but without success; plans for October week in Maymyo fell to the ground, and in the end I don't think we could have found a side at all owing to a fresh outbreak of casualties and sickness. It had been our intention to have gone to Pyawbwe to stay at the Military Police Stud Farm and play continuous polo with the reserve battalion who could have mounted us, but difficulties over housing and particularly heavy rains in September made it impossible.

A few of us have been out regularly with the Country Club, who hold their paper-chase meets near Mingaladon. These were Barnard and Temple and occasionally Theobalds, Godman and Luard. Barnard's "Equity," a fine horse which he bought a year ago after carrying him most successfully the whole season, developed kumrie in October and had to be destroyed, the Colonel's "Coldstream" also died earlier in the season.

Some have indulged in a little small game shooting; bags of snipe are in no way comparable to those at Mandalay. The Colonel had good sport at Christmas, and Darell Brown went up the Chindwin to shoot jungle fowl on the rebound from the Mandalay week, while Newton-King and Hamersley tried their luck after bigger stuff in May without success.

At football the Regiment had an indifferent season; we never could find a satisfactory team, and we met defeat early in the Walter Locke which we had won three years ago, and in the league we showed very mediocre form. Rugby is as popular as ever and, thanks to Luard who led the team very successfully, we were able to field a hard-working team who could be relied upon to try out all opponents.

In boxing we have done distinctly well, winning the Inter-Services Tournament in January, securing two Burma champions, and an Army and R.A.F. champion in Cpl. Turk. We did not fare so well in the quadrangular tournament, when the *Enterprise* was in, but even so, our team put up a good show.

At the Burma Rifle Association meeting at Maymyo we entered for most events and were every bit as successful as in 1932, a very creditable performance, as all practice had to be carried out at Mingaladon under very different conditions of light and temperature. We won the Serjeants' match, the Lewis Gun Cup, the Machine Gun Challenge Cup, and both the team and individual revolver matches. Hamersley has thus won the individual cup three times out of the four he has been in Burma.

The Rangoon Searchlight Tattoo, which we put on with the 1/17th Dogras (P.W.O.) in December claimed all our energies for quite a time, and luckily was well received by the citizens of Rangoon of all nationalities. If forecasts are true, it should prove of considerable assistance to regimental charities.

Changes in officers have been heavy. On the debit side there has been Booth to Quetta, and Whitfeld to D.A.A.G., Bombay, two serious losses to polo. Hamilton and Richards to the 43rd, Newton-King and Hamersley to the Depot, and Campbell, who has resigned. The arrivals include Wootten, who soon made his presence felt in the gym. world, Naylor from the A.F.L, Lowndes-Stone-Norton and Warner early in the year from the 43rd, and Kilburn, Last and Edmunds in October. A change of adjutants took place, and Theobalds went home on a year's leave in September to make a change in his surroundings and to work for the Staff College.

On reading this through I find that possibly I may have painted rather a gloomy picture of 1933, but for all our disappointments there were many bright spots,, and the Regiment is in as good trim as ever, full of expectations and hopes for success in 1934.
